Edgar S. Milton, age 95, longtime resident of Ozark, Arkansas, formerly of Emporia, Kansas, and recent resident of Clarksville, Arkansas, died December 26, 2016. He was born October 29, 1921 in Denning, Arkansas and was a graduate of Ozark High School. A World War II veteran, he achieved the rank of Master Sergeant in the Army Air Corps. He was an active member of the United Methodist Church for many years, was a Mason, and was a retired salesman for Continental Grain. Edgar married his high school sweetheart, Argie Hazel Dickerson, whom he affectionately called "Sadie". They were married for 67 years. He was preceded in death by his parents, Lora Floyd Milton and Edgar Stokes Milton, and his wife, Argie Hazel Milton.

He is survived by his son, Edgar S.
